RENEWABLE RESOURCES: Their Significance

in the Most Developed Part of the Country

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1 Northeastern U. S. and adjacent Canada, the most developed part of the continent

--oldest area, settled and developed most
--illustrations
--coupon clipping as the most pleasant way of receiving one's living

2. Recent concern about the competitiveness and viability of the economy of this whole region

--regionwide problems with primary growth elsewhere

- --NYC as one kind of example
- --Michigan's unusually concentrated and energy dependent economy as a second example
- 3. Renewable resources including forests are important as one means for working toward a modestly more diverse, modestly less vulnerable economy

--evident interest of diverse groups in this possibility --Michigan examples: Jaakko Poyry, wood for energy --efficiency considerations: tax limitations

- 4. Some major implications for forest resources
 - --urgent need for overall strategies involving all major landowners (statewide plan)

--sort out the major purposes of land management, separate conflicting uses

--"intensify management" in several different dimensions

- 5. Possible implications for management of nurseries and related facilities/ programs
 - --type conversion on a moderate scale may be one means for increasing productivity (Most productive sites only, constraints regarding other values)
 - --expanded nursery production may be needed with emphasis on superior stock (expanded in relation to recent levels, perhaps not in relation to much earlier historic highs)
 - --opportunity and need for further rationalization and interstate cooperation
 - ---northeastern analysis of efficient patterns of production/distribution
 - ---case for similar analysis in north central
 - ---challenge to find ways to get advantages of such interstate specialization without the problems

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
